Some thoughts on living with rabbits

Bunnies, bunnies, bunnies! What could be cuter or more fun than a pet rabbit? But wait, before you give into that impulse, be sure you are prepared for this addition to your family! There are many myths and assumptions about rabbit care and sometimes the so-called “experts” are a bit off the mark!

Rabbits must live indoors to be happy and healthy.

Mostly false. Even in Wisconsin, rabbits can be safely (and happily) housed indoors or outdoors. Regardless of where you choose to house your bunny, there are some “bunny basics” about that housing.

Rabbits need a cage that is as long as 3 times their full-grown length and as wide as 1 ½ times their full-grown length. This is the minimum! A happy rabbit will have an enclosure larger than this or a play area they spend several hours each day in. Keep in mind that rabbits are active, social animals. Would you like to spend your entire day in your walk-in closet?

Rabbits need a “hide-box” to feel emotionally secure.

This is true whether they are indoors or out! The box should be big enough for them to turn around

in and lay down in. If it is too large it does not serve its purpose!

Use hay (grass hay) or straw as bedding, especially in the hide boxes. They often chew on blankets or other items so use care with those. Shavings or pelleted bedding can be used in some areas but tend to not be as effective as the hay or straw.

Rabbits that are housed outdoors must have somewhere that they can get that is out of the wind AND dry. A wet, cold bunny will often become ill. It is ok for them to have a warm hutch (with a hide box) and a larger pen that they can choose to be in or not.

In the summer rabbits housed outdoors need shade! They can easily overheat. 2-liter bottles can be filled with water and frozen, then placed in the cage during the day to act as a coolant.

Rabbits housed outdoors need predator-proof caging! This cannot be stressed enough. Most of the commercial rabbit hutches are attractive but a determined dog or coyote can easily bend the bars. When rabbits are frightened they DO NOT huddle quietly in their hide box and wait for danger to pass! They may dash around the

cage resulting in a foot slipping through the floor or sides of the cage. The tragic results are not something you want to return home to!

They need a solid floor for at least part of their housing. While wire is easier for us to clean up, it is very hard on their feet and can result in pododermatitis (“sore-hocks”) which is a very painful and sometimes difficult to treat condition.

Toys, toys, toys! Rabbits need a variety of toys to keep them busy, mostly things they can either destroy, chew up or things that can be rolled so that they dispense a treat.

The biggest issue that I see with rabbits living outdoors is that after the first few weeks they become a “forgotten pet”, living behind the garage and only seeing their family a few times a week when they drop in new food and water. Some families are able to integrate their outdoor bunnies very well; usually people who have done a lot of research and planning or those who have had bunnies before.

Rabbits do well on a diet composed entirely of pellets.

False! To put it bluntly, pellets were

created for production rabbits. These high protein, high calcium, high calorie, low/short fiber pellets were created for people raising rabbits for food and fur! So if you don't plan on eating or wearing your friend, pellets will be a very small part of their diet! Do they like them? Of course they do! (You like fast food, right!?) Do they have a place? Absolutely! Baby bunnies and young rabbits may have free choice pellets up until about 6-9 months of age. After that, NO MORE than 2 Tbls/5 lbs body weight each day! The diet of a wild rabbit consists of large quantities of low calorie-high/long fiber foods – grasses, bark, leaves, etc. There is no version of pellets in the wild!!

An adult rabbit should be fed:

- Free choice grass hay (timothy, orchard grass, brome, etc.)
- 1 cup of fresh green leafy veggies/ carrots per 5 lbs body weight each day. (Introduce new veggies slowly to prevent loose stools!)
- Maximum of 2 Tbls pellets/5 lbs body weight each day

Feeding an appropriate diet helps prevent the majority of issues rabbits are faced with! (obesity, sore-hocks, gastric stasis, diarrhea, etc.)

Rabbits require no veterinary care.

Nope, another falsehood!

Rabbits require less veterinary care than a dog or a cat, and there are no vaccinations needed in the United States. However, annual examinations are recommended as they can develop infections (often pasteurella), dental issues, ear infections and other medical conditions. Most of these can be treated or managed with regular care. It is recommended that all non-breeding female rabbits be spayed as uterine and ovarian diseases are extremely common

in rabbits over 3-5 years of age. In many cases, uterine disease will be the cause of death in an intact female rabbit. Male rabbits have strong smelling urine that they may spray, just like a Tom-cat. For this reason, many people prefer to have their males neutered also. It is important to seek care from a veterinarian that routinely sees rabbits as their care and anesthetic requirements are very specialized. (You may have a fabulous podiatrist but you wouldn't go to them for a heart problem, right!?)

A rabbit is a great first pet!

This one depends on the family! Rabbits can be good pets for children, BUT - and this is a big but – they are somewhat fragile! Jumping out of a child's arms can result in a fractured leg or back and all too often ends in euthanasia. They are also fairly long-lived compared to other "first pets" commonly living 8-12 years (the average rat lives approximately 3 years). This means that mom and dad may have the responsibility of a pet long after their child has lost interest. So if mom and dad want a rabbit and are willing to assume the responsibility, care and supervision, a rabbit may do great with kids (they almost never bite or intentionally scratch) but I wouldn't get one just because little Amy just has to have one!

Rabbits are easily litter box trained.

This depends on your definition of "easily"! Rabbits tend to deposit feces/urine in one location, usually a corner. If you put a container in that area with material in it that the rabbit likes (shavings, pelleted litter, shredded paper, etc) they may or may not deposit waste there. Most rabbits will ultimately use a litter box over

time, if you continue to place it in the area they have already chosen! Even when they are "litter trained", you need a litter box in each room or location the rabbit is in as they won't travel through 3 rooms to find a box!

Rabbits can run loose in the house like a cat.

Probably not unless you are fabulous at "rabbit proofing"! Rabbits like to chew, it's what they do! And they aren't very picky: carpet, woodwork, walls, electrical cords, furniture, etc. If it can be reached it can be chewed. Most times it is simply annoying or destructive but in the case of electrical cords it is downright dangerous! Best to have them confined when they aren't supervised.

Hopefully this gives you some ideas for caring for the rabbit you have, or the rabbit that may join your family soon! They are wonderful, curious, social creatures and thrive in a safe, well-enriched and social environment!
